Challenges

AGING FACILITIES AND LEARNING SPACE DEFICIENCIES


- Most of the Primary building (4K through 2nd grade) building is over 60 years old and there are over \$8 million in maintenance repairs needed.
- Building was designed in the 1950s and lacks instructional space to teach new educational programs and learning opportunities.
- Lacks proper space for physical education, assembly, music/drama performance, and community programs.
- Existing spaces for special education, career and technical education (CTE), art, and science lab space are not adequate for today's learning.
- Lacks secured entrances at both school buildings.
- Operationally, many teachers and staff members travel between buildings, which is not an efficient use of time or District dollars.

Proposed Solutions

IMPROVES LEARNING SPACES AND OPPORTUNITIES TO PREPARE STUDENTS FOR SUCCESS

- Construct a new Primary building with 21st Century Learning spaces to improve educational opportunities, building function, and space utilization.
- Remodel special education spaces, career and technical education (CTE), art, and science lab at the High School to improve learning opportunities.
- Greatly improves indoor air quality, lighting, and temperature control, creating a healthier environment.
- Creates a multi-purpose space for performing arts and athletics.
- Attraction/retention tool for students, teachers, and families, which will help our community prosper in the future.
- Provides adequate and accessible space for special education programs.
- Secure entrances and security monitoring at each entrance.
